DOREEN IRIS MARSDEN



All members of the Yorkshire Ladies' Council will have been saddened by the news of the death of Doreen Marsden on 19 June this year.

Doreen was a quiet unostentatious lady always mindful of the needs of others. There can be few Yorkshire Ladies, past or present, who have not appreciated an act of kindness or sympathy from Doreen at a time of need. I personally did. I counted her a great friend and was glad to continue our friendship when Doreen moved to Edinburgh and I visited my family there.

Doreen suffered sadness in her life; the loss of one son in a road accident, the loss of her doctor daughter to cancer and the too early death of Philip her husband. But happily she took great pleasure in the travelling exploits of her three granddaughters and in their academic achievements. And she revelled in her gardens here in Leeds and then in Edinburgh. She loved music and was a great supporter of the Leeds International Piano Competition. In fact music played by Radu Lupu, an LIPC winner was played at her funeral.

Doreen believed strongly in women's education and all her life she worked to increase opportunities for women to broaden their education, obtain qualifications and develop their ability to contribute equally with men to society.

The YLCE provided the ideal vehicle through which she could further her beliefs, especially after the sale of the Secretarial College in 1988 which she as Honorary Treasurer negotiated. Then with Jillian Rennie, her great friend, the Awards Committee was set up. Doreen chaired this Committee for 12 years and the structures and systems she set up still hold.

Hundreds of women have reason to be grateful to Doreen and that venture. Doreen became a Vice-President in 2002.

Doreen was conscious too of the needs of older women, especially those alone. She was much involved in the establishment of Forest Hill. She was Company Secretary of the Yorkshire Ladies' Council (Hostels) Ltd until 1987. In the early years she and Philip provided 'hands on help' from their home nearby!

Doreen gave valiant service to YLCE in many roles. We are grateful for her generous and conscientious support and we are glad we knew her.

Life as a member of the Awards Committee is never dull. Would you be interested in joining us? The June and September meetings brought 154 applications for personal awards and 54 were granted. The committee also agreed to renew its yearly grants to The School of Music in the University of Leeds, to provide funding for the historic YLCE /Clarkson scholarships and to the Leeds College of Music to provide postgraduate Yorkshire Ladies' Council of Education Scholarships for women.

Your committee is privileged to receive many letters of thanks and appreciation from award holders. These continue to confirm (if confirmation were needed) the value of our work. An unusual and moving letter was recently received from a woman who the committee was unable to help. She expressed her gratitude for our consideration of her application and understood why, when there are so many applicants, her application had not been successful. She also supported our decision to provide an award to a woman who was less fortunate that herself.

Many YLCE award holders are high fliers and will undoubtedly be future leaders in their chosen fields. One young award holder is studying for an MA in Glass Conservation and Heritage Management in the University of York. She wrote to thank the Council for her award. She writes that she is enjoying the course and is pleased to report that she is doing well. She describes her enjoyment of the theoretical study of heritage conservation and management as well as practical

workshop experience. She has been involved in helping to restore ancient glass and is learning new glass production techniques appropriate to modern decorative glass designs. She has already had responsibility in helping to fit gallery skylights in a prestigious modern building in Glasgow.

The Awards holders, and members of your committee, are fully aware that it is due to YOU, the members of the Council, that funds are available to provide the much appreciated awards and scholarships. We all thank you for your continuing support.

Those of you who have known of Forest Hill for many years will be sad to hear that Mrs Doreen Marsden died in June surrounded by her family at her home in Edinburgh. In a voluntary capacity, she was the Company Secretary/ Administrator for many years in the 1970s and 1980s, she organised the building of the north and south wings in 1974 and the refurbishment of the house and annexe thus converting the rest of the building into self contained flats in 1986. She retired in 1987 when her position was taken by me as an employee. I shall always be grateful for all the help and kindness she gave me.

After serving for twenty years on the House Committee Miss Barbara Neale resigned but will remain on the Board of Directors. We thank her for all she has done for Forest Hill, we shall miss her charm and wisdom, but welcome her continued support on the Board.

After many months the work installing replacement windows is almost complete and seems to have been carried out with minimum disruption to the residents. The staff are to be thanked for their efforts in making the undertaking as smooth as possible. Everyone is pleased with the result and we look forward to a warm and draught free winter.

There have been several changes of residents over the past few months, some have moved into further care and sadly Miss Mary Hill died in August. She had been a resident at Forest Hill for over ten years and had been a strong member of the small group of representatives attending the House Committee meetings and also helped with the organisation of the Music Group. Three flats are vacant and are being prepared for re-letting in November.

The day of the Garden Party in June was bright, sunny and warm and was enjoyed by those who attended. The attendance was much less than in past years so it has been agreed to hold next year's event on a Thursday, not on a Saturday which was tried as an experiment this year. After the receipt of some generous donations the amount raised for the Amenities Fund at Forest Hill was £508.

The residents are now looking forward to the activities organised for them through the winter months by Kathryn Taylor - Manager and Tess Watach - Resident Supervisor.

The House Committee is looking for some new members, we welcome any member of the YLCE who is interested in helping to make the lives of those living at Forest Hill as happy and fulfilled as possible.

Carol O'Connor of the Inside Outside Club at St Gregory's Church, Seacroft, brought a photographic display and spoke about the work of the special needs' teacher funded by money raised by the Projects' Committee over the years. We also heard a moving account of the educational and support work provided for homeless women at St George's Crypt at Leeds where extra funding is needed for programmes promoting women's self-esteem and life skills which enable those facing desperate challenges to start to take more control over their lives.

Following the Coffee Morning the Projects' Committee sent £250 to St Gregory's and £100 to St George's Crypt.

As we are all aware, fundraising at every level has become increasingly difficult over the past few, challenging years. Next year the Projects Committee hopes, in

particular, to continue to support the Inside Outside Club at St Gregory's, which is situated in one of the most deprived areas of Leeds. Our 2015 Coffee Morning is already booked and will take place on Thursday 19th March, again at St Chad's Parish Centre. Please come and support us - we look forward to seeing you there!

Support is given to Families who may be struggling to cope with a variety of challenging situations such as: Post Natal illness, Disability, Isolation, the demands of parenting young children, Bereavement, Multiple Births, helping to prevent these difficulties from escalating into a crisis that can cause Family breakdown. A Representative from the Charity will give a short presentation of their work at 12-45pm.
