Letter from our Chairman

Dear Yorkshire Ladies

Those of you who attended the AGM in February will already be aware of the launch of The Jillian Rennie Appeal.

Jill served the Yorkshire Ladies for over 40 years alongside her career as a senior administrator at the University of Leeds, and later, in the Lord Lieutenant's Office. She was YLCE Chairman for 10 years from 1985-95 and it was during this time that she and the Hon. Treasurer, Mrs Doreen Marsden, negotiated the sale of the Yorkshire Ladies' Secretarial College. The proceeds of the sale were used to establish the Awards Fund with the specific purpose of supporting the education and training of women. That had been the declared aim of the Yorkshire Ladies' Council of Education since its inception in the 1870s, but until 1989 there had never been any actual capital set aside to meet these needs in a targeted way.

Jill followed Doreen as Chairman of the Awards Committee in 2002. Together they set up sound systems firstly for disbursing scholarships to local institutions most of which had a long connection with the YLCE but, above all, for the consideration and scrutiny of personal applications for grants from British women. The guidelines they established are still in use today. The Awards Committee continues to provide grants from the income of the Awards Fund.

Jill was particularly sympathetic towards the struggles many women face to gain the qualifications which are needed to allow them to support themselves and to contribute to the well-being of their families and of their communities. Of the 250 to 300 women who apply every year, only about 100 can be helped; nevertheless, we have been able to help over 1000 women so far and now we need to help more!

We want to do two things during this period of The Appeal: one is to commemorate Jill's lasting contribution to the Yorkshire Ladies and the other is to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary (2014) of the Awards Fund. To me, celebration is about having a good time together with

friends. We are going to have lots of opportunities to do just that in the coming months. Several members have already generously arranged events for us. Mrs Francoise Logan, MBE, has organised a recital and afternoon tea on 17 June at the Leeds College of Music, possibly featuring some of our scholarship students there. Mrs Mary Herbert has arranged a luncheon at Devonshire Hall on 12 August. Other occasions are in the planning stages, such as other luncheons and an exhibition at a Leeds venue displaying the long history of the YLCE (we need help with this).

We want every member to join in this celebration of the Yorkshire Ladies' Council of Education's past, present and future. So that all of us can participate in one way or another, it has been suggested that each of us try to raise at least £100 to contribute to The Jillian Rennie Appeal. You could do this by holding a plant sale or a coffee morning for friends or by going out for lunch with friends and asking each of them to contribute to this very worthy cause. Be creative and have fun!

I, with much help from volunteers, will be sending out letters of appeal to past recipients of awards, to people with personal or corporate connections to Jill Rennie, to those with connections to the Yorkshire Ladies and, of course, to all members. So you will all be hearing from me.

In the meantime I hope to see you at our usual spring/summer events, the Project Committee's Coffee Morning on 23 May and Forest Hill's Garden Party on 25 June.

Projects Committee

This past year the Projects Committee continued to support the extra needs teacher at St Gregory's as well as offering a second year of support for Settle. Both undertake valuable work in struggling communities. The Inside Outside Club at St Gregory's is based in Seacroft, one of the most deprived areas of Leeds and offers valuable educational and practical support for children of school age as well as their parents, while Settle helps to integrate refugee women into the community at large.

Looking forward, we will be holding our annual Coffee Morning on Thursday 23 May at St Chad's Parish Centre, Otley Road, Headingley, well known to YLCE members as the venue for our Annual General Meetings. This year we will be raising funds for the educational programme at St George's Crypt in Leeds which gives vocational and remedial training to destitute and homeless people to help them regain a feeling of self-worth and to develop skills towards employability.

At the Coffee morning we will be selling cakes, home-made produce and plants. We will also be offering jewellery, handbags and accessories for sale, as well as cards and good quality second hand books and CDs. All our guests are encouraged to bring boxes of cereal and tinned food for the Inside Outside Club, which will be used to ensure the children who attend there will be sent to school after sitting down to a good breakfast. We welcome all your contributions, be they food for the children, or cakes, plants, books and CDs for sale on our own stalls.

We have enclosed an invitation giving details about the Coffee Morning with this newsletter. There is ample parking at the Parish Centre and we urge you to please try to join us on 23 May. If you really are not able to come, please consider donating cakes and/or plants for someone else to bring. Donations by cheque may be sent to Mrs Tricia Hollis, and would be gratefully received but we do hope you will be able to join us in person.

Awards Committee

A year has now passed since the death of Jill Rennie and the appeal to honour her memory and to mark the 25 years of the Awards Fund (in 2014) has just begun. YLCE Awards are greatly appreciated by the British women who receive them but at the moment only about one third of those women who apply can be given a grant. The sum of £200 is the usual amount awarded and your committee believes YLCE members would consider it appropriate to provide a few more grants of £300 or £400 to especially deserving individuals. We would be delighted if, as a result of The Jillian Rennie Appeal, the Awards Fund could be increased so that more money would be available to provide even more grants! At the recent quarterly Awards Committee meetings of January and March 2013 a total of ninety eight applications were considered; fifty eight were refused and thirty seven provided with awards.

YLCE Awards do make a difference. Shaneen, a Leeds woman in her late twenties, has worked hard in her job as an apprentice health worker. Now, fully qualified, she is caring for people with mental health problems. The confidence she has gained in her work has encouraged her to aspire to becoming a fully qualified midwife. An YLCE award has helped her to pay for an Access to Health course so that she can achieve the required academic qualifications. Shaneen writes to tell us that she has been achieving distinction grades in her present course and that she has been awarded a conditional place at The University of Bradford to study midwifery. She is keen to thank YLCE members for their support and is 'so grateful to everyone who saw potential in me'. She also hopes that the YLCE will be able to continue to support women like her to fulfil their ambitions.

Claire is a postgraduate student in the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama. She writes to tell us that she feels she is receiving outstanding tuition in vocal performance techniques and is enjoying a wide range of experience having sung recently in opera and oratorio. She concludes her letter, 'Please convey my thanks to the Council for their support. I feel humbled that you chose to help me in my studies in the current financial climate'.

Friends of University Art and Music Concert...

...dedicated to the memory of Jillian Rennie

I am quite sure that all members of the YLCE are fully aware of the impact Jillian Rennie had on the life and work of the Council, notably the part she played in the establishment of the Educational Awards Fund. What members may not know about is Jillian's commitment to other aspects of cultural life in Leeds, particularly that of the University of Leeds where she spent much of her working life.

At an inspiring concert held on 1 February in the Clothworkers Centenary Concert Hall, University of Leeds and given by the Cassia String Quartet, Jillian's professional work in the university and, especially her voluntary work, were commemorated.



Jillian was one of the founder members of the Friends of University Art and Music. This organisation was set up in 1989 (a busy year for Jillian!) it's purpose being, at a time of financial restraint, to raise funds to compliment and develop participation in art and music in the university. Jillian organised, supported and developed this new organisation and, over the years, art works have been purchased for the Art Gallery and free concerts supported. Jillian helped to set up a robust organisation which continues to thrive today. A large audience, which included a member of Jillian's family and some of her close friends, enjoyed the Cassia String quartet 's performances of Haydn's String quartet Op76 no.4 and Brahms string Quartet Op51 no.2 in A minor. The quartet are a group of very talented young musicians, one of whom is a Leeds graduate, who are now based in the Northern College of Music. They perform frequently in the north of England and are quartet in residence at *Arts@Trinity* in Leeds. Jillian would have enjoyed meeting them and would have delighted in their confident and sensitive performance of this challenging music.

John Battle introduces Temple and Beveridge

The Leeds Association of Women Graduates had invited the former Leeds West MP, the Rt Hon John Battle to talk to them in February and had extended an invitation to YLCE members to join them. Several members took advantage of the invitation to hear Mr Battle's talk on *William Temple, Beveridge and the origins of the Welfare State* - a subject which was close to his heart and one on which he was thoroughly wellversed.

Many of us were surprised when he started off by referring to the monks of Kirkstall Abbey and their particular brand of charitable endeavour as one of the forerunners of our present system. Archbishop Temple and William Beveridge (*The Beveridge Report*) were highly influential in laying the foundations for what became the Welfare State. John Battle was concerned to stress that he felt that it was time to revert to what had been at the root of the post war developments, namely that welfare had to be earned - through national insurance contributions, providing a financial safety net, a social insurance, from cradle to grave that met interruptions to people's ability to care for themselves and their families in times of sickness, unemployment or retirement.

This was an especially timely topic given the considerable changes being made to the welfare system this year and gave us food for thought.
