Christmas will soon be upon us, and the Social Committee will be busy making an abundance of goodies for our Annual Sandwich Lunch which is to be held on Thursday 9th November from 11.30am-2pm, at St. Chad's Church Parish Centre, Headingley. In addition to the Food Stall, there will be Handbags and Scarves, Jewellery, Phoenix Cards, Fancy Goods, Books, CDs and a raffle.

The Charity we are supporting this year is St. George's Crypt. This is a charity in the City of Leeds, working with the homeless, the vulnerable, and those suffering from addiction. The Charity believes that by demonstrating the love of Christ in a caring and practical way, lives can be transformed, regardless of people's circumstances. They aim to meet the basic needs of everyone in a safe, non-judgmental and caring environment. They support people who are living on the streets, helping them to find accommodation, and to gain the skills and confidence to enable them to take an active role in their futures.

There are over 50 bed spaces, 365 days of the year. The centre offers immediate practical support in terms of food, clothing and washing facilities. There is an in-house therapeutic treatment recovery programme for men and women with drug and alcohol addiction and a variety of opportunities to engage in voluntary work on projects such as catering, gardening, woodwork, art and drama, all providing a structured approach to learning.

A representative from St. George's Crypt will give a presentation on the many aspects of the work of this very worthwhile charity at the Sandwich Lunch on 9th November. Please support this popular event, bring your friends and help us to enjoy a successful event.

Our annual fundraising Coffee Morning was held in March, as you'll know, at St Chad's Parish Centre, Otley Road, Headingley. As well as the shopping and social activities, guests enjoyed presentations from our chosen charities.

Carole O'Connor of The Inside Outside Club at St Gregory's, Seacroft, spoke about the needs and challenges of providing educational and practical support for school-age children in one of the most deprived areas of Leeds. She kindly brought a number of thank you cards made by the children which showed how much they, as well as the staff, appreciate the help given by the YLCE to their organisation. The money raised by the Projects' Committee at the Coffee Morning will be used to support the extra needs teacher at the Club.

We also had a presentation by Carolyn Browne, the manager of the Riding for the Disabled Association in Wakefield, a joint venture with the Camphill Project. Wakefield RDA provides horse riding to improve the health and well-being of people with

disabilities in the Wakefield District. This year, the money raised by the Projects' Committee enabled us to give the Wakefield RDA a cheque for £300 which allowed them to send three riders to the RDA National Championships at Hartpury College in June.





Competing at the National Championships gives the young riders a real boost to their self-esteem and confidence. while the Association itself provides therapy. achievement and enjoyment to disabled people all over the UK. Thank you to all who supported us at the Coffee Morning, your generosity helped to give three young people a day they will always remember.

We were very pleased afterwards to receive handmade cards of thanks and photographs from the young riders and their families.

It is always heartening to know that the hard work of all those who helped at the Coffee Morning and the money raised by our guests are greatly appreciated by the recipients and make a positive contribution towards the lives of children and young people struggling with grave disadvantages.

Awards

Your indefatigable Awards Committee has been working hard this last half-year, coming to terms with the joys - and technical niceties - of our new online application procedure. You will have read all about the innovations in the last Newsletter.

Our June meeting was the first without any paper forms for us to scrutinise: all applications were on the screen to read. We sat round the table with laptops and tablets at the ready to double check on the website if necessary and confirm the notes we'd already made at home in the preceding weeks. Our Deputy Chairman Carol Gleisner and I had managed to eliminate beforehand the ineligible applications and those from women with hopeless, unrealizable dreams. We followed the same successful pattern for the September round of awards and have emerged unscathed. You can believe that we congratulated ourselves on being wonderfully efficient when I tell you that on the day both in June and September we reviewed 97 applications within four or five hours. All told in the two meetings we disbursed £19,600 to 63 deserving women. And the flood of thanks which they send us is quite disarming. These thanks I now pass on to you, generous members of YLCE. Do keep up your support.

We've been noting a recurring theme: we get applications from mothers of children with special needs; the mothers' experience of managing those needs leads them to wish to attain a qualification to help others overcome similar problems.

Single mother Nicola, 49, a qualified social worker and childcare professional, works now as a nursery assistant and is sole carer for her disabled daughter with complex needs. Nicola wants to pursue a part-time course leading to a Diploma in Counselling and Psychotherapy. Working as a Psychotherapist will give her much greater flexibility to cope with her daughter's needs.

40 year-old single mother Katherine has a son born with multiple allergies and has spent the last five years researching and learning how to manage them. With a qualification as a Nutritional Therapist she can put her experience to good use and earn a realistic income to support herself and her son.

Experienced 'Early Learning' teacher Katie, who's 37, has a four-year-old daughter with unilateral hearing loss. She wants to take a Diploma in 'Special Education for Teachers of Children with Hearing Loss'. She has already given up her full-time teaching job and is working as a Higher Level Teaching Assistant. "Without the current additional pressure of teachers' commitments (such as written detailed planning and assessment) I now have time to study and fulfill my ambition to become a Teacher of the Deaf."

Margaret, who is 50, has a long career in community nursing. She has herself been through domestic violence and helped her children cope. She has been a volunteer with the charity Independent Domestic Abuse Services for a number of years. She knows exactly what research is needed and will follow an MA course in Social Research, concentrating on Gender and Women's Studies. And we're sure she will put that research to good use.

All four of these determined women will let us know how they get on and whether their expectations are fulfilled. They might well be like Charlie, whose photograph as a proud veterinary graduate you'll remember from the Newsletter of Autumn 2012. She is one of the many recipients who enjoy keeping up their relationship with us way beyond the end of their course.

Charlie still works in the practice where she began her veterinary career and recently sent us a picture of one of her newest patients. She also sent us a donation: "Thanks once again for everything you did for me." Enough said.

The William Merritt Disabled Living Centre

Prof Anne Chamberlain welcomed us to the new home of the William Merritt Disabled Living and Mobility Centre in Rodley, where it recently opened, having moved from the old St Mary's Hospital in Armley.

This very impressive facility offers practical training for occupational therapists, provides information and experience for the medical profession and gives active help and advice for disabled children, adults, parents, carers and other professionals.

The range of facilities and equipment we saw ranged from assistive technology (much used by teenagers and young men) to driving adaptions with 8 different types of adapted vehicles to try out

There were walking aids, stairlifts, bathroom and bedroom adaptions, all singing and all dancing beds, chairs of all kinds showing how they can be chosen to help all heights and degrees of disability. The range of kitchen adaptions were very interesting, showing how what was innovative for disabled people 25 years ago is now very much part of a modern, state of the art, kitchen such as pull out drawers instead of cupboards beneath work surfaces, and pull down shelves in wall cupboards to mention but two.

This Centre is the brainchild of Prof Chamberlain who, in her role as a consultant rheumatologist, not only saw people of all age groups disabled by arthritis and rheumatism, but also as a result of strokes and accidents to the spine.

The Centre is her response to observed needs. It is excellent.

Those members of YLCE who were able to come had a memorable day.

The York Gate Garden, Adel

On Thursday 20th July a party of Yorkshire Ladies visited the York

Gate Garden in Adel for a talk by Fleure Gethin, a local landscape architect and designer, entitled 'How York Gate Garden was Made'

The afternoon started with a glass of 'bubbly' on arrival followed by a most interesting talk on the



Arts and Crafts Movement and how the values and philosophy of the movement influenced the design and building of York Gate Garden.



York Gate Garden was the creation of the Spencer family, Fred and Sybil, who purchased the house and six acres of land in 1951, initially running a farm where they also kept horses and pigs. The farm was sold in 1958 and from then on their focus was the remaining one acre of garden. This became the main interest of Sybil Spencer and her son Robin, who had developed a love of

gardening during his holidays from boarding school, and who was responsible for much of the later design of the garden.

The intention was to create a cottage garden in the arts and crafts manner in the small one-acre site. The garden has evolved over a long period of time and has many distinctive features, for example the 'Pyramid' Yew Hedge, the Bonsai Court, the Summer House, the White Garden, the Sundial, the Japanese Lanterns, and the Dolphin Fountain in the raised Canal (the 'Moonpool').





Sadly Robin died in 1982, but following his death his mother decided to continue with his vision for the garden.

For those interested in hearing her speak on this there is a clip on YouTube called "Sybil Spencer at York Gate" and this offers some insight into her views.

With Sybil's death in 1994, at the age of 86, the garden was bequeathed to the 'Gardener's Royal Benevolent Society'



(now known as 'Perennial') with the proviso that the garden should remain open for the public to visit for their enjoyment and education.

This was a most interesting and enjoyable afternoon and fully fulfilled Sybil Spencer's wish that the garden should remain a public facility to be enjoyed by generations to come.

Following the talk we had an opportunity to explore the amazing garden, looked after by two full-time career gardeners, Adam Bowley and Charlotte Reynolds, carefully preserving the Spencer horticultural heritage.















We wandered at leisure in the tranquility of the garden before returning at 4:00 to the 'The Field Room' where we'd earlier learned so much from Fleure about the history of York Gate. There waiting for us, as if produced by magic, were delicious cakes and strawberries and cream and yes, more bubbly!

Some of us already knew the garden well and often brought visiting friends to this 'secret place'. For others of us it was an inspiring new experience, which we will want to repeat and repeat again. I heard plans being made to bring spouses along, in the hope that they might get the gardening bug — or at least wait quietly munching in the café while their other halves enjoyed the beauty of this horticultural gem.

YLCE Special Bursaries

It was decided only too fitting that we should create newly named *YLCE Special Bursaries* from the monies you, our members, give at the series of events inaugurated last year by Joanne de Pennington and Rosemary Ward. That first event was the talk by Louise Cantley on 'Women, the Criminal Justice System and Afterwards'.

We thought Hannah, who's now doing an MA in Social Work, was the most appropriate recipient of the money raised at Louise's talk. Hannah's first degree was in Criminology and Psychology. She was now aiming to become a mental health social worker, having understood society's need. And I'm sure Louise would approve.

Ella is named as the recipient of the bursary awarded from the money raised at the 'Pepys at Christmas' concert. She's doing a Masters in Performance in Piano Accompaniment at the Royal College of Music. An undervalued field of achievement, we thought. And one appreciated by Ad Hoc Baroque.

From the money raised at the 'William Merritt Disabled Living Centre Visit' we awarded a bursary to Kirstin so that she could finish her Graduate Entry Medicine degree. She actually already has a PhD in Neuroscience and was researching pain mechanisms, but was feeling increasingly more detached from the people she was trying to help. She decided she could get closer by doing a further degree in medicine. Society needs doctors whose wish is to understand the needs of all their patients, not least the disabled.

We had no applicant wanting to pursue a course in any aspect of horticulture, so for the York Gate Gardens bursary we chose an aspiring weather girl. Lauren is just starting an MSc in Atmosphere, Ocean and Climate with a view to putting her Maths degree to good use in forecasting models. All gardeners I'm assured are grateful for all the forecast detail they can get.

The Awards Committee – Vacancies

The Committee consists of 9 members and meets 3 times a year, in mid March, mid June and mid September. Members make themselves available for all 3 meetings if possible. Meetings usually take place in the Chairman's home. They begin at 10am and are usually over by 3 or 3:30pm.

Potential new members need to be used to reading material on screen. Applications for awards are now made online. At least 10 days before the meeting members receive a list of suitable applications which they then access via the website so that they can consider the merits of each application at leisure before the meeting. There are now between 80 and 100 applications to be considered at each meeting. The meetings are enjoyable, satisfying and rewarding.

Current members of the Awards Committee have career experience in many fields, for example, education, business, administration and music. It would be helpful for a new member to have some knowledge of the British education and qualification structure – but by no means essential; such knowledge can be acquired. All members have an interest in supporting women to qualify for a worthwhile career and fulfill their personal goals.
